Often with such films, it seems about the time you reach some resolve with the quest suddenly the credits are rolling. Interesting are the similarities to my term as president; just when I'm starting to get the hang of it, the forecast suddenly calls for snow and it's convention time. Fortunately for all of us, the gavel is soon to be passed to very capable hands. Bernie Guerrettaz will preside before the close of convention ceremonies and I am sincerely looking forward to his direction during the upcoming year.

And speaking of the convention, what a celebrated cast has been set for this year's production. Milt Denny, Gary Kent, Kris Kline, Mike Pallamary, Larry Phipps ... I think you get the picture. Hats off to the Northwest Chapter for hosting the 2015 Convention and the job they have done to help deliver anoth-

er successful conference.

As we focus on some of the changes this year, one of the more recent involved a change in our by-laws which now provides for electronic voting through the "Members Only" section of the ISPLS website. While votes can still be cast by paper ballot, the new method is much less time consuming, less expensive to process, and additionally saves the voting member the cost of postage; thus a Win-Win-Win in the budget column. While we believed this would lead to an increase in participation, similar to our recent general election it likewise proved to experience low voter turnout. However, despite disappointing box office numbers, the results still produced two thumbs up. Congratulations to Rich Hudson as he begins another term as President Elect in January, a mere twenty years since his last one.

The September BOD meeting was held at Vincennes University and included an update from Bill Clark and Austin Yake on the status and outlook of the Surveying Program. In short, it was evident that the program is continuing to experience challenges, as is our profession; and any dilemma for promoting the program requires little examination in order to solve – it comes from an affiliated source: each of us. As the ISPLS Board serves in an advisory capacity to this program, we continue to be committed and volunteer our support to ensure the program not only continues to produce talented graduates today, but that the legacy endures. I urge you not to wait to be asked to help in this effort; give Bill or Austin a call or e-mail and inquire how you may help. It may simply involve volunteering for a career day in your area or a letter of support for the program – I'm confident they will have a place for you. And the same holds true for the other programs as well. Seek out Tony Gregory, Carol Morman and others at the conference for more information on their volunteer needs.

And let us not forget our legislative efforts. As the midterm elections recently closed, the Indiana General Assembly is soon to kick off in full session. Both Senate and House members have already convened for Organization Day and they will be at top speed by convention time. The Legislative Committee has been working with our lobbyist, Mike O'Brien, in order to position ourselves with familiar faces for ongoing objectives. Stay tuned for more details on HB 1127 (Actions against a surveyor, or Statute of Repose), SB 405 (Underground Utility Facilities), and cooperative efforts with the County Surveyors Association regarding petitions to direct funds to section corner perpetuation from the increase of recording fees. As CEUs are accumulating in January we hope to report more details on these actions.

So now as the time calls for drawing the curtain on another year, I wish to thank each of you for the honor in serving along with you over that time. 2014 did not bring about the fulfillment to all the matters we wished to resolve – but it comes to a close just the same. In the aforementioned movie, Ben Gates discovers the value of the extreme measures connected to the clue – the secret lies with Charlotte. Hopefully the treasures (i.e. marks, references, monuments) we leave behind call for far less time and complexity to uncover.

So until we meet in January – have a safe and Merry Christmas, a Happy New Year – and enjoy your popcorn.

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ISPLS BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

August 9, 2014

The ISPLS Board of Directors met on Saturday, August 9, 2014 at ISPLS Headquarters, Indianapolis, Indiana. President Don West called the meeting to order at 9:00 am EDT. All board members were in attendance with the exception of Bernie Guerrettaz, Sean Suttles, Dennis Grumpp, Todd Bauer, and Tony Gregory, NSPS Director. Others in attendance were Jason Coyle, Executive Director of ISPLS.

President West briefly reviewed the ISPLS Mission and Vision Statement and noted the "Rules of Order" for the meeting. A motion was made by Eric Banschbach and seconded by Perry Cloyd to accept the agenda as adjusted. The motion passed by a voice vote.

The minutes from the June 28, 2014 meeting were reviewed and accepted. A motion was made by Perry Cloyd and seconded by Ron Wharry to accept the Board of Directors' meeting minutes as amended. The motion passed by a voice vote.

The Treasurer's Reports were reviewed and narrated by Jason Coyle. Financial reports ending June 30, 2014 were presented for board review. Assets totaled \$241,681.93 as of June 30, 2014. Jason also covered the income and expense report, investment report, budget, and the profit and loss report. There was board discussion regarding the profit and loss report. A motion to accept the Financial Reports was made by Don Williams and seconded by Bryan Catlin. The motion passed by a voice vote.

The Board heard and reviewed the Executive Director's report. Executive Director Coyle presented a written report and discussed highlights with the board. There was Board discussion on several items. The following information was also discussed as a part of his report: John T. Ellingson, Wisconsin Geodetic Advisor, requested booth space at the 2015 ISPLS Convention. It was decided to extend a convention registration and exhibitor's booth space to him in return for a seminar presentation on Friday. The Board also discussed the State Geodetic Advisor and the possible changes in the future to a Regional Advisor.

ISPLS Committee reports: Executive Director Coyle gave a report concerning the Publications and Media Committee during his Executive Director's report. Jason Coyle reported that Tony Gregory, State Trig-Star Coordinator, will have a full report of the State's Trig-Star activities for the Summer Edition of the Hoosier Surveyor.

Jason Coyle, the Board of Registration Liaison, reported on the Board of Registration for Professional Surveyors meeting that took place on July 25, 2014. During that meeting, the Board of Registration discussed the make-up of the required "27 hours" of surveying courses needed to take the exam and the Professional Surveyor Reference Form. The next the Board of Registration for Professional Surveyors meeting is October 3, 2014. Executive Director Coyle gave a legislative update concerning the statute of repose legislation, the Indiana-Michigan State Line Commission and potential changes to the dig law during his Executive Director's report.

Eric Banschbach gave a report for the Geodetic Control Workgroup. Eric reported that there is continued work on the State Geodetic Network in the Vincennes and Seymour Districts. One of the reset monuments falls in the Lincoln Boyhood National Memorial property. There was discussion regarding a commemorative disk and/or sign. This could be something for the Foundation to be involved with. Eric also reported that the low-distortion coordinate system development is moving forward.

Rich Hudson, By-Laws Committee Chair, noted that electronic voting and the definition of "In Good Standing" will be reviewed by the committee – they are gathering additional information at this time. Three members from the current Board of Directors agreed to be included with the slate of nominees for upcoming President-Elect election. Those names will be sent to the Nominations Committee.

Frank Walsko, Chair of the Young Professionals, send a report detailing the committees progress. Frank is seeking ideas and direction from the ISPLS Board of Directors. Don West, Chair for the Facilities Committee, noted that the committee continues to conduct online searches of potential office space. The current lease ends June of 2015.

Scholarships were awarded to two students from Purdue University Calumet. Foundation is considering the creation of a logo. Next foundation meeting will be in August 19, 2014.

The motion passed by a voice vote.

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At 8:51 am EDT, the Board continued with the Personal Appearance of James Barton, Jr. concerning the reinstatement of his Professional Surveyor license which had expired over three (3) years ago. Apparently, Mr. Barton had a tax obligation to the State of Indiana – Department of Revenue prior to the license renewal period for July 2010. As such, the Department of Revenue placed a hold on any renewal towards his license until the obligation was paid. In December 2010, Mr. Barton attempted to renew his license. The December 2010 renewal was never processed since there was a hold on his license. In July 2012, Mr. Barton called the Professional Licensing Agency to inquire about renewing his expired/on hold license; however there was no attempt to renew. In August 2014, Mr. Barton paid the tax obligation to the State of Indiana – Department of Revenue through the closing of a real estate transaction. With the hold removed from his license, Mr. Barton is seeking reinstatement of his license. There were several minutes of Board discussion concerning the timeline of events that had transpired and the validity of the survey work performed while his license was expired. Gary Kent made a motion to reinstate Mr. Barton license and to refer the unlicensed practice to the Attorney General's Office for an investigation. The motion was seconded by Mike DeBoy and passed with a voice vote.

The hearing was in regards to a Petition of Review for Denial of Application, Cause Number SBRLS 14-05. The Board had reviewed Mr. Jarret's application for Professional Surveyor and denied it based upon his work experience. Mr. Jarret had the required number of years of experience, but failed to properly convey on his application that he had obtained at least 60% of his land surveying experience with those activities listed within Indiana Code 25-21.5-1-7(b)(4) through IC 25-21.5-1-7(b)(7). Mr. Jarret presented additional information and evidence concerning his work experience during the hearing. Upon conclusion of the hearing and further Board discussion, a motion was made by Gary Kent and seconded by Doug Lechner to approve Mr. Jarret's application and allow him to sit for the exam. The motion passed with a voice vote. It should be noted that Gary Kent mentioned that the "Verification of Reference for Registration as Land Surveyor" form is unclear and ambiguous.

At 8:46 am EDT, the Board continued with an Administrative Hearing in the Matter of the Application for Stuart C. Eddy. The hearing was in regards to a Petition of Review for Denial of Application, Cause Number SBRLS 14-07. Similar to the above hearing, the Board had reviewed Mr. Eddy's application for Professional Surveyor and denied it based upon his work experience. Mr. Eddy had the required number of years of experience, but failed to properly convey on his application that he had obtained at least 60% of his land surveying experience with those activities listed within Indiana Code 25-21.5-1-7(b)(4) through IC 25-21.5-1-7(b)(7). Mr. Eddy presented addition information and evidence concerning his work experience during the hearing. Upon conclusion of the hearing and further Board discussion, a motion was made by Rich Hudson and seconded by Mike DeBoy to approve Mr. Eddy's application and allow him to sit for the exam. The motion passed with a voice vote.

The Board continued with an Administrative Hearing in the Matter of the Application for Douglas Chinn. The hearing was in regards to a Petition of Review for Denial of Application, Cause Number SBRLS 14-06. The Board had previously reviewed Mr. Chinn's application for Professional Surveyor and denied it based upon it not meeting the minimum educational requirements for mathematics and science subjects. Mr. Chinn was not in attendance for the meeting. The Board members further reviewed his application and petition letter and after much discussion determined he still did not meet the minimum educational requirements. A motion was made by Rich Hudson and seconded by Doug Lechner to dismiss the petition. The motion passed with a voice vote.

After a short break, the Board continued with Probationary Reports for J. Bernard Feeney, Michael Sadlon, Ronald Morrison, and Stephen Williams. There was substantially nothing to report concerning these individuals since they had not prepared any surveys.

The Board discussed the applications that were reviewed and reported as to whether they were approved or denied. The following applications were approved:

- 1. Neal Balah Surveyor Intern
- 2. Jason Gustafson Professional Surveyor by Comity
- 3. Amy Bernicken Professional Surveyor by Comity

The Board discussed the continuing education application for Red Vector Online Education for Design and Construction. A motion was made by Gary Kent and seconded by Doug Lechner to deny the first ten (10) courses and accept the eleventh (11th) course. The motion passed with a voice vote.

The Board then turned their attention to the discussion items on the agenda. The Board had a discussion that was led by Gary Kent concerning rule changes and seeking approval for those through the Governor's Office. The "Rule Change" pertaining to the twenty-seven (27) semester credit hours in college level surveying courses. The change would not require any additional credits, but would rather redefine what topics would need to be included in the coursework. The proposed draft language included "Control surveying including GPS" and "Geographic information systems (GIS)." Gary Kent also led a discussion concerning the revised reference forms that accompany an application for registration as a Professional Surveyor. Gary passed out a draft and discussed the changes with the Board.

The Professional Licensing Staff led a discussion concerning the application review process and the Surveyor Intern application termination process as described in the Indiana Administrative Code.

Doug Lechner discussed a task force that National Council of Examiners for Engineering and Surveying (NCEES) has assembled to tackle the following charges: 1) evaluate the surveying profession and give suggestion to NCEES for improving the interest of the profession among young people and 2) to determine whether or not the state specific exam can move towards computer-based testing.

The Board then voted for the Officers for the Board, which are as follows:

Chairperson: Christine Arnold; Vice-Chairperson: Ross Holloway; Board Liaison: Gary Kent

After realizing they had skipped the adoption of the minutes from July 25, 2014 meeting, the Board tabled them until the next meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 12:32 am EDT. The next scheduled meeting is Friday, January 30, 2014 at 9:00 am EST at Indiana Government Center South, 402 W. Washington Street, Room W064, Indianapolis, Indiana 46204.

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
ISPLS - NSPS GOVERNOR / DIRECTOR REPORT

Report concerning the NSPS Fall 2014 Meetings from Tony Gregory, Indiana NSPS Governor/Director

The NSPS Fall 2014 meetings were held at the Sheraton Overland Park Hotel in Overland Park, Kansas from October 22 until October 24, 2014.

The Great Lakes Council met on Wednesday, October 22. Discussion items included:

- A report on various NSPS Policy Changes
- The NSPS Strategic Plan update on final plan which will be up to vote at Board of Governor's Meeting
- Discussion on implementation of NSPS Speakers Group that was approved by Board of Directors at Spring 2014 meeting
- Motion to bring forward a proposal to the Board of Governors to create an area on the NSPS website to publish Public Relations items and projects
- Motion to bring forward a proposal to the Board of Governors to create a Public Relations Award
- Motion to bring forward a proposal to the Board of Governors a Minimum Educational Requirement for licensure as a land surveyor
- Motion to bring forward a proposal to the Board of Governors to allow for the creation of an NSPS On-Line Journal



- US Representative Kevin Yoder (Kansas) made a presentation to the Board of Governors.
- Report from Curt Sumner, NSPS Executive Director
 - ♦ State of Society is "good"
 - Texas has approved MOU for 100% membership. Colorado has polled its state members and reported 80% in favor of 100% membership
 - NCEES relationship with NSPS is growing. NCEES created a packet for Trig-Star and will be sending postcards to math teachers from middle school up promoting the program
 - ♦ NSPS Student Competition is now open to 2-year programs
 - ♦ NSPS 2015 Conference being planned for April 12-15 in Washington DC area
 - ♦ NSPS 2015 Fall Meetings being planned October 8-10 in Sandusky, Ohio
- NSPS Budget John Fenn, NSPS Treasurer, reported the following:

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- A motion was passed to adopt an NSPS Policy on the Minimum Educational Requirements for licensure as a land surveyor, as follows:
 - Replace the existing NSPS education policy with the following language: "The official position of the National Society of Professional Surveyors shall be that a Bachelor's Degree in Surveying, Surveying Engineering, or Surveying Engineering Technology be the minimum educational requirement for licensure as a Land Surveyor in all jurisdictions."
- A motion was passed to allow for the creation of the Journal of Applied Geomatics (charged to NSPS Education Committee)
- A motion was passed that states "A member designated by the NSPS Board of Directors or elected by the NSPS Membership will provide to NSPS staff, within a 30 day period after the bi-annual meetings, a summary of the meeting and a copy of all final approved motions to be disseminated to all State Executives, NSPS staff, Governors, Board of Directors and EXCOM members.
- ♦ A motion was passed to accept the NSPS Strategic Plan

- A motion was passed to amend the NSPS Bylaws by removing all references and language relating to the position of Area Director from the entire NSPS Bylaws document.
- A motion was passed to amend the NSPS Bylaws by removing Article VII (Board of Governors) in its entirety, as well as all other references to the BOG and the BOG Chairman and BOG Secretary from the entire NSPS Bylaws document.
- A motion was passed to approve a Memorandum of Understanding between NSPS and Professional Surveyors of Canada



LEGAL SURVEYS

The goal of this column is to provide brief summaries of recent Indiana Court of Appeals and Supreme Court cases involving topics related to surveying practice, certainly not to provide legal advice. Duneland Properties, LLC, Duneland Sand, Inc., Duneland Sand Enterprises, LLC, Duneland Holdings, LLC, David Lasco and Lasco Family Trust vs. Northern Indiana Public Service Company, Indiana Court of Appeals Case No. 56A03-1308-PL-320, July 30, 2014

This is an appeal from the Newton Superior Court (formerly from the Porter Superior Court) of a case where Northern Indiana Public Service Company (NIPSCO) has held a 100 foot wide easement in Porter County since 1955. The easement is occupied by a 138,000 volt transmission line between substations near Crown Point and Valparaiso. The easement passes along the southern edge of a 374 acre tract which is used to mine sand.



In 1999, the property owner wished to remove sand near the easement. A NIPSCO engineer determined that the cost to move the lines to accommodate the owners request was approximately \$125,000. Sand excavation did not begin at that time.

After the creation of business entities in 2000 to operate a sand mining business, sand was removed from the tract as well as the easement area over several months. In June of 2003, NIPSCO sent a cease and desist letter to stop sand mining on their easement. The excavation encroached along about 2,200 feet of the easement and compromised the integrity of four structures and made it unsafe or impossible to access those structures with equipment. An August 2003 NIPSCO estimate to move the lines was now \$155,389.

Although mining stopped in the easement following the letter, it resumed in 2006 because the sand was "too valuable". Ownership changes as well as the creation of differing entities took place before and during the proceedings which began when NIPSCO filed a complaint for a permanent injunction in October 2007. NIPSCO asked that the defendants be responsible for fill and moving fill per NIPSCO specifications around their towers as well as be permanently enjoined from encroaching upon or damaging NIPSCO's property interests in the easement. After other proceedings, in February 2011 the trial court ordered that the Duneland Entities were permanently enjoined from encroaching in NIPSCO's easement. After settlement discussions, the court ordered that NIPSCO would relocate the easement in August 2011 with the court to later determine cost of remediation and the allocation of those costs. In April 2013, a NIPSCO civil engineer testified that the costs of relocating the lines onto the new easement were estimated at \$245,858. In May 2013 the court found NIPSCO had not failed to mitigate damages by failing to protect the easement because they had proposed moving the easement as restoring the existing easement would have cost \$2.7 million. The court ordered the owner execute a new easement, deliver it to NIPSCO within 10 days and pay \$245,858 for reconstruction. NIPSCO was given a lien for that amount against the entire sand mine property. The Duneland Entities appealed.

On appeal, the Duneland Entities argued that NIPSCO is barred from relief because they did not mitigate damages and that the court erred in entering the material and labor estimates to relocate the lines into evidence because it is hearsay.

The Appeals Court agreed with the trial court that NIPSCO did mitigate its damages. NIPSCO was legally entitled to have the topography in its existing easement remediated and instead proposed a less costly alternative, and an agreed upon order states that. The Appeals Court also believed that Duneland was confusing mitigation of damages with laches (the legal doctrine that a legal right or claim will not be enforced or allowed if a long delay in asserting the right or claim has prejudiced the advised party).

The Appeals Court also agreed that a state-licensed civil engineer as an expert is entitled to rely on reasonable data such as the cost of materials, labor index and other items contained, in this case, in NIPSCO's computer databases (as opposed to personally speaking with the individuals who submitted the cost data to the computer system). The NIPSCO engineer in this case had worked in the transmission-line department for thirty-five years.

The decision of the trial court was affirmed.

Andrea M. Fears and Edwin G. Fears vs. Charles W. Axsom and Peggy L. Axsom as Trustees of the Charles W. and Peggy L. Axsom Revocable Trust, Indiana Court of Appeals Case No. 07A04-1305-PL-243, July 11, 2014 - MEMORANDUM DECISION - not regarded as precedent

The Fearses and Axsoms own real estate in Brown County with a common boundary line. After a survey, a boundary dispute arose, a trial was held in the Brown Circuit Court and the court ordered the property re-surveyed. On May 27, 2011, the parties met with their attorneys present to try to resolve the dispute. A handwritten document, purported to be a settlement agreement, was prepared and signed by Lisa Fears and Andrea Fears who purportedly had authority to act for Grant Fears and Edwin Fears. This document included cost and boundary information. After negotiations broke down, the Axsom Trust sued on May 3, 2012 to enforce the settlement agreement. The Fearses moved for summary judgment, asserting the settlement agreement was unenforceable since it was not a valid contract for sale or a contract to enforce a settlement agreement. The trial court denied this motion.

On appeal the Fearses argue the settlement agreement is unenforceable because it does not comply with the statute of frauds. Since that is an issue here summary judgment was properly denied. For arguments sake, the court reasons that the partial performance of other items related to the document takes it out of the statute of frauds. Here the partial performance included agreeing on various boundaries and paying for aerial photography.

The other arguments made also did not qualify for summary judgment as there were issues of fact at stake. The Appeals Court affirmed the denial of motion for summary judgment.


INDIANA-MICHIGAN STATE LINE COMMISSION - MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

Minutes Provided by Office of Land Survey and Remonumentation, Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs, State of Michigan

The Indiana-Michigan Boundary Line Commission met Tuesday, July 8, in the County Commissioners Meeting Room on the seventh floor of the County City Building, 227 W. Jefferson Blvd., South Bend, Ind. Commission members present were John McNamara, chairman, Indiana; David Mostrom, vice-chairman, Michigan; Anthony Hendricks, Rex Pranger and Michael Ruff, Indiana; and John Kamer and Chris Marbach, Michigan. Those not present were Brad Cramer, Indiana; and Michael Lodzinski and Edward Reed, Michigan. The July 8 meeting agenda and the minutes from the June 10 meeting were approved.

Chris Beland, director of the State of Michigan's Office of Land Survey and Remonumentation, discussed the request for proposals that he had sent out and the changes that had been suggested. The commission also discussed monument specifications, including those for the cap, and the use of those caps already purchased by St. Joseph County, Indiana; reimbursing St. Joseph County for caps previously purchased; and whether a surveyor should be on site at all times, certain times, or not at all.



Beland discussed cost estimates that had been developed based on the project's scope. One estimate came from the Michigan Department of Transportation, and he prepared one estimate. He said there was interest in getting additional estimates, especially from the State of Indiana or representatives of Indiana.

He also said the Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs was not comfortable with moving forward to post the request for proposals until a projected funding discrepancy identified by cost estimates was resolved. He recommended that the commission communicate the funding discrepancy to both state's legislatures and request an increase in the available funding allocated for the project. The commission went on to discuss the estimated project costs and providing notification to both states. The recommendation was that Beland draft a letter to the legislature requesting that additional funding be allocated for the project. Beland said he would like to have the letter distributed by mid-August, giving commissioners until the end of July to review the estimates provided or develop additional estimates. The commissioners then voted unanimously to have Michigan's Office of Land Survey and Remonumentation draft the letter requesting additional funding.

The August 12 meeting was then cancelled.

LETTER FROM INDIANA-MICHIGAN BOUNDARY LINE COMMISSION

Dear Mssrs. Atkins, Keefer, Muchmore and Roberts:

As Chairman of the Indiana-Michigan Boundary Line Commission, created under Indiana Code 1-3-2, Indiana-Michigan Boundary Line Commission, and Michigan Statute 2010 PA 259, Michigan and Indiana State Line Monumentation Act, I am writing to inform you that the Commission has concluded that the current \$1 million funding available to complete the survey and remonumentation of the Indiana-Michigan border is insufficient. Further, it is our recommendation that work on this project not commence until adequate funding is available.

The Commission has determined that, in all probability, time and the elements have rendered most of the original evidence obliterated, and to properly carry out the survey and remonumentation of the Indiana-Michigan border will require a retracement survey of all 110 miles of the boundary line and remonumentation of most of the 125 mile and meander posts marking the border. And, based on estimates received, we believe that the cost to complete this project may reach approximately \$2 million.

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
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Each state's Legislature has provided that the cost of this project be shared equitably, with both states initially appropriating \$200,000, or a total of \$400,000, with which to begin the project. Michigan's enabling legislation, however, limits the total funding to "... not greater than \$500,000." Thus, a match from the State of Indiana would only provide \$1 million for the project or approximately half of the funds necessary to complete the project.

The Commission is requesting the respective Legislatures increase the available funding for this project and allocate \$1 million each for completion of the survey and remonumentation of the Indiana-Michigan border.



The Art of Land Surveying

Bringing Common Sense to Accepting or Setting Survey Corners. Today with the common use of GPS and modern technology, science seems to be getting the upper hand in this age old struggle between the Art of Surveying and the Science of Surveying. This has resulted in surveyors setting many additional corners, in some cases next to established property corners. In some instances this has resulted in court fights and lawsuits that are totally unnecessary. The modern surveying profession needs to understand more about the art of accepting and proofing evidence of existing property boundary locations. Learning to survey properly not just based on technology or mathematical calculations.

This seminar will attempt to present the case for the "Art of Land Surveying", based on long standing principles of the rights of the entryman and case law. Where the entryman is occupying property based on the good faith effort of the original surveyor that used different standards and technology to locate the property description on the surface of our earth. Ethics and Standard of Care: Ethics is a branch of philosophy that involves the concepts of right and wrong conduct. Indeed it is one of the more important facets of land surveying and, unfortunately, one of the most neglected. In contemporary society, far too few people embrace this concept. The Land Surveyor is in a unique role wherein much of his/her work is done out of the eye of general inspection and as such, every decision is, by definition, ethic based. Moreover, many Land Surveyors are in a role of supervision over younger surveyors where their role as a mentor is of immense value and they must instill solid ethical values in their successors. Mr. Pallamary has been retained by various insurance companies to defend other Land Surveyors when their actions, relative to Standard of Care, are called into question as this can be a standard for a finding of negligence. Unfortunately, many Land Surveyors are unfamiliar with this concept, a problem complicated by the fact that Standard of Care is not a uniform standard as it varies from region to region and state to state; it is determined by the standard that would be exercised by the reasonably prudent Land Surveyor in Indiana, and may not be the same from north to south.

Evidence and Procedures for Boundary Control: With the advent of electronic measuring equipment and single person measuring occurring, many measuring people are unfamiliar with the importance of evidence and the application of sound surveying practices as there is no one to teach them what to do or what to look for. Far too many field crews survey by coordinates while concurrently overlooking the most important facet of land surveying, that of sound evidence and monument recovery. Mr. Pallamary will discuss many of the concepts espoused by Curtis Brown and how they must be incorporated in boundary line surveying including: Using historical knowledge as evidence; Professional liability; How to report evidence and use it in court; Court conduct, both as a defendant and as an expert witness; The origins of boundary evidence and its contemporary evolution

Riparian and Littoral Boundaries: A riparian owner acquires rights to public waters up to the shoreline and it is the Land Surveyor's role to determine the location of that line. These rights may be transferred in a deed or other real estate conveyance without special mention and the person who grants the deed may reserve riparian rights. In addition, a fee owner may also convey the ability to exercise riparian rights through an easement. There are a number of interesting water boundary cases that have come out of Indiana and although the rules vary from state to state, the general concepts are the same. Mr. Pallamary will discuss the evolution of water boundary law as well as the application of federal laws to water boundary determination. He will also discuss the importance of the Land Surveyor in establishing littoral and riparian boundaries both as to methodology and applicable Standard of Care.

We will start out our day by bringing everyone up to date on the major changes made to OSHA's Hazard Communications Standard. All businesses in the United States who use anything from white out to inverted marking paint to tanker loads of hazardous chemicals are required to train their workers on the new Globally Harmonized System (GHS) for identification and training. We will introduce this topic and give some valuable information to allow you to train your workers on GHS. OSHA will soon start looking for compliance with this important new topic. We will continue with basic field safety on both land and water. We will finish with traffic safety and the requirements for protecting workers. Those attending will obtain an understanding of the New Globally Harmonized System for dealing with hazardous materials. With a little work you should be able to go back and conduct a class for your workers. We will cover basic field safety for surveyors along with the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control devices and the required vests.

NGS Datasheets; DS-World; and OPUS-Projects John T. Ellingston, PE, PLS · 3 CEU (Elective) 8:00am - 11:00am

NGS Datasheets: NGS datasheets provide a great amount of information on the 22,734 Indiana survey marks that are contained within the NGS database. This presentation will help you understand and make use of the detailed information that is available on a datasheet. The NGS Advisor will also provide you with information and tips that will help you avoid misusing or making mistakes when using that information. Surveyors are encouraged to attend because the Indiana Low Distortion Projections that will be coming soon will require that surveyors relate their projects to the NGS National Spatial Reference System (NSRS). This is easily accomplished by using published horizontal data found on some datasheets, but not all.

DS-World: This session will demonstrate a very easy to use, yet powerful, free software program from the National Geodetic Survey known as "DSWorld". This program allows users to perform a variety of mark search methods for any of the 22,734 Indiana survey marks that are found in the NGS database. It creates a KML file of the search results, with mark locations, and displays the file in Google Earth. From the Google Earth display, DSWorld provides easy access to viewing the datasheets. Besides providing quick access to a mark's datasheet, the user can quickly choose other options such as viewing the mark's published position, viewing images of the mark if they exist, retrieving info on neighboring marks, and viewing "to-reach" descriptions. The program also enables users to easily submit recovery notes, as well as submit images of recovered marks, that will be included with a mark's datasheet. This presentation will provide information on many of the dozens of functions that DSWorld enables surveyors to perform.

OPUS-Projects: In January 2104, the National Geodetic Survey released a web-based GPS positioning tool, known as "OPUS-Projects". OPUS-Projects enables surveyors to observe, compute, and complete a least-squares adjustment of GPS projects to the sub-centimeter level. New, inexpensive GPS receivers have recently become available which are designed for use with OPUS-Projects, enabling nearly every surveyor to be GPS enabled. The presenter will start with a brief intro to the original NGS "Online Positioning User Service" (OPUS) and then provide attendees with a step-by-step demonstration on using OPUS-Projects. The demonstration will reveal the ease-of-use and powerful performance of OPUS-Projects.

Least Squares Adjustment Demystified Bruce Carlson · 3 CEU (Elective) 12:45pm - 3:30pm

Data adjustment is an integral part of most survey projects. Modern computers have allowed surveyors to use adjustment techniques that were all but impossible in the past. Least Squares adjustment provides the best and most informative adjustment technique possible. It allows more control and flexibility over the adjustment process than traditional methods and provides the surveyor with a powerful data analyzation tool. We will be using Carlson SurvNET as the processing software in our presentation. There will be a brief discussion of measurement errors, error propagation, and traditional error adjustment techniques. We will then create and process several survey projects. This will include the analyzation of the data and statistical reports.

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
