Unanimously adopted this 12th day of May, 1984, at a regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Indiana Society of Professional Land Surveyors.





ISPLS SCHOLARSHIPS - Reasons to Give

As the end of the year approaches, now is the time for ISPLS members to consider donating to the ISPLS Scholarship Fund at the University of their choice (Purdue or Vincennes).

When the facts are analyzed, it can be shown that a \$100.00 donation actually costs only about \$20.00 to give.

Consult with your accountant for your particular case. The Indiana tax credit is good up to a maximum credit of \$100.

PLEASE GIVE !!

"A LEGISLATIVE EXPERIENCE"

INDIANAPOLIS (August 7, 1984)——Several of Indiana's engineering and surveying societies are planning "A Legislative Experience" to educate and inform engineers and surveyors.

On November 28, at the Adams Mark in Indianapolis, the forum will present an overview of the legislative process, the importance of participation by engineers in the process and legislation of specific interest to engineers and surveyors. It will begin with an 8:00 a.m. breakfast buffet followed by the 8:30-11:00 a.m. seminar.

Individual engineering societies have held legislative forums and conducted their own legislative efforts in the past. The groups have recently acknowledged that much more needs to be done to encourage engineers to be active, and that the associations need to work together to achieve success in the legislature. Informal efforts of some group members began last year by supporting individual pieces of legislation. This summer however, representatives of Indiana Society of Professional Engineers, Indiana Society of Professional Land Surveyors, Indianapolis Scientific and Engineering Foundation and Consulting Engineers of Indiana have designed this special forum.

The group is seeking high quality speakers including leaders from the Indiana House and Senate. Ron Riemer, of Reid, Quebe, Allison and Wilcox and Associates, Inc. and chairman of the organizing committee, commented "Hopefully our speakers will provide insights to our profession on how to be effective with the legislature and inspire our engineers into action."

Engineers and Scientists from all societies and associations are encouraged to attend and bring their state representatives or senator. "We need to make our concerns known to all 150 legislators, and to do so we need participation by engineers from every discipline," added Riemer.

NEW ATTORNEY GENERAL'S OPINION

The County Surveyor's Office

The following three pages represent the Official Opinion of the Indiana Attorney General's Office with regard to a request for an opinion on the employment of non-registered individuals in County Surveyors Offices in Indiana.

The Opinion was rendered in January of this year; however, the Editor of the Hoosier Surveyor has only recently been made aware of this development.

OFFICIAL OPINION NO. 84-1

Dear Representative

This is in response to your request for an opinion whether it is unconstitutional for the office of county surveyor to employ individuals to do surveying work who are not registered surveyors as provided by Indiana Code Chapter 25-31-1.

ANALYSIS

Article 6, § 2 of the Constitution of Indiana designates the county surveyor as a county office. Therefore, the office of county surveyor is a constitutional office. The Constitution does not require the county surveyor to be registered or prescribe his duties.

The General Assembly cannot prescribe qualifications for holding a constitutional office which are additional to the qualifications prescribed by the Constitution. See In re Petition of Justice of the Peace Association of Ind., (1958) 237 Ind. 436, 147 N.E.2d 16.

The General Assembly by Indiana Code Chapter 25-31-1, Indiana Code Chapter 36-2-12 and other statutory provisions does not establish registration as a qualification for holding the office of county surveyor in violation of the Indiana Constitution. It does prescribe his duties and limit his activities while holding office if he is not a registered surveyor. See 1970 Ind. O.A.G. No. 8, p. 18.

When Indiana Code Chapter 25-31-1, Indiana Code Chapter 36-2-12 and other statutory provisions are read together, it is clear that a county surveyor who is not registered as a land surveyor with the Board of Professional Engineers and Land Surveyors may hold his office but may not personally engage in land surveying. See 1970 Ind. O.A.G. No. 8, p. 8.

January 13, 1984 Page Two

The General Assembly has power to create offices, and to fix the qualifications of the holders thereof as it may see fit subject only to the restrictions imposed by the Constitution. State ex rel. Workman v. Goldthait, (1909) 172 Ind. 210, 87 N.E. 133. Article 6, § 3 of the Constitution of Indiana authorizes the election or appointment of such county and township officers, as may be necessary, in such manner as provided by law.

Indiana Code Section 36-2-16-5 authorizes the county surveyor to appoint one (1) first or chief deputy, if authorized by the fiscal body, and also the number of other full-time or part-time deputies and employees authorized by the county fiscal body. A deputy county surveyor must be a competent civil engineer.

Indiana Code Section 36-2-16-3 provides that a deputy appointed under the chapter may perform all the official duties of the officer who appointed him and is subject to the same regulations and penalties as the officer. The officer appointing the deputy is responsible for all the official acts of the deputy.

Indiana Code Section 36-2-12-8 provides that if a surveyor is a competent civil engineer he shall plan and supervise all surveying and civil engineering work of the county under the direction of the county executive. If he is not a competent civil engineer, the county executive shall appoint a competent civil engineer for each surveying or civil engineering project that the executive orders or receives a petition for.

Indiana Code Section 36-2-12-11, concerning corner stones, provides that the surveyor shall administer the section if he is registered as a land surveyor under IC 25-31. If he is not so registered, he shall with the approval of the county executive, appoint a person who is registered as a land surveyor to administer the section.

Indiana Code Chapter 25-31-1 is a professional licensing act covering all surveyors and engineers. Regulations under authority of Indiana Code Chapter 25-31-1 were promulgated by the State Board of Registration for Professional Engineers and Land Surveyors. See 864 IAC 1.1. They must be read together with all other code provisions concerning county surveyors.

Every person is prohibited from engaging in or offering to engage in the practice of engineering or land surveying unless and until he shall submit evidence that he is qualified to January 13, 1984 Page Three

practice and shall have been registered or is exempted under Indiana Code Chapter 25-31-1. See IC 25-31-1-1.

Engaging in or offering to engage in the practice of professional engineering or land surveying without being registered or exempted under the laws of the state is a Class B misdemeanor. See IC 25-31-1-27. The practice of land surveying is defined in Indiana Code Section 25-31-1-2(g) and (h).

Any employee or subordinate of any person who holds a certificate of registration under the provisions of the act is exempt provided that the practice of such employee or subordinate does not include responsible charge of design or supervision. See IC 25-31-1-20(b).

No plat showing streets, lots, blocks or any subdivision of land in the State of Indiana shall be approved by any county planning or zoning authority; nor shall be accepted for transfer or recording which has not been prepared or certified as to correctness of the survey by a registered land surveyor. See IC 25-31-1-19(b).

CONCLUSION

It is, therefore, my Official Opinion that it would not be unconstitutional for the office of county surveyor to employ individuals to do surveying work who are not registered surveyors as provided by Indiana Code Chapter 25-31-1. However, depending upon whether the county surveyor is or is not a registered surveyor and/or registered professional engineer and the duties assigned to the deputy surveyor or employee, it may be a statutory violation under Indiana Code Chapter 25-31-1 or other Code Titles specifying the duties of a county surveyor for a county surveyor to employ unregistered surveyors as deputies or employees. A deputy county surveyor must be a competent civil engineer pursuant to Indiana Code Section 36-2-16-5.




ISPLS Policy on Check-out of Library Books

THE SOCIAL LIFE — A REVIEW OF THE 1984 ASP-ACSM FALL CONVENTION IN SAN ANTONIO

Sunday morning, September 9th, found Orwic and I at the Indianapolis International Airport, loaded down with our luggage, plus all sorts, sizes, and weights of paraphernalia for the Indiana Exhibit at the ACSM-ASP Fall Convention held this year in San Antonio, Texas.
